Write an essay based on **one** of the essay prompts below. Your essay must be **no more** than 500 words (excluding references) to be considered.

Essay Prompts (choose one):

- Insects are amazing chemists. Explain an example of how a specific species of insect uses chemistry (such as for survival, communication or defense).
- John Law was a chemist by training but soon entered the field of entomology, dedicating most of his
 career to studying molecular entomology, a topic he wrote about in an article in "Annual Review of
 Entomology:" https://www.annualreviews.org/doi/10.1146/annurev-ento-010814-020910. Explain how
 a strong chemistry background can be an asset for careers in all branches of science.

Entries will be judged based upon:

- Chemistry knowledge
- Scientific accuracy
- Structure and thesis
- Relevance to the prompt
- Originality
- Grammar and citations

Contest rules:

- All essays must be no more than 500 words, excluding references
- Entries are judged based upon relevance to the selected prompt
- · All entries must be original works without aid from others.
- · Only one entry per student will be accepted.
- Acceptance of prizes constitutes consent to use winners' names, likenesses, and entries for editorial, advertising, and publicity purposes.
- Students must be sponsored by a school or another sponsoring group (e.g. Homeschool Association, Boys and Girls Club, Scout Troop, 4-H, etc.).
